5-In-1	5m	4m	Five varieties grafted onto the same tree. Self-pollinating.	4
Cortland	5m	4m	Large red apple, good for eating and cooking. Late September	4
Earligold	5m	4m	Medium-sized golden fruit; tart, juicy & crisp. For eating, cooking & cider. Early August.	5b
Empire	6m	4m	Medium-sized red fruit, similar to McIntosh but with firmer flesh. Late September.	4b
Golden Delicious	6m	4m	Medium to large yellow fruit, best for fresh eating. Mid October.	4
Granny Smith	6m	4m	Large grass-green apple with crisp, firm, tart flesh. Great all purpose apple. Requires a long growing season; only suitable for Southern Ontario. Late October.	6
Idared	5m	4m	Large red apple; sweetly tart. Fresh or cooking. Persistent fruit. Early October.	5
McIntosh	6m	4m	Medium-large red and green fruit, mildly tart. Eating & cooking/baking. Ripens in September. An Ontario native; discovered in the wild near Ottawa in 1811.	4
Mutsu (Crispin)	6m	4m	Very large green-yellow fruit. Good for eating & cooking/baking. Ripens mid October. Tri-pollinator that requires two other varieties to produce fruit.	5
Northern Spy	5m	4m	Red apple; tart, firm flesh makes it ideal for baking. Mid October.	4
Red Delicious	5m	4m	Large red apple. Crisp skin with soft, sweet flesh. Great pollinizer. Late September.	5
Spartan	5m	4m	McIntosh type with juicy, sweet flesh. Fresh eating & baking. Stores well. Early Oct.	5
APRICOT				
Goldcot	4m	3m	Round orange fruit, eating & canning, Late July, self pollinating	5
Harcot	4m	3m	Late blooming variety, Good in regions susceptible to late frost. Round orange freestone fruit; red blush. Good for fresh eating. Earliest apricot to ripen, late July.	5
Moorpark (Wenatchee Moorpark)	4m	3m	Freestone fruit is large with golden skin and flesh. Good cold tolerance. Mid August.	4
Puget Gold	4m	3m	Large golden fruit; tolerates rain and cold weather. Freestone. Early August.	5
CHERRY				
*Sweet and sour cannot pollinate each other. All sour cherries are self-pollinating. [SP] denotes self-pollinating for sweet cherries.				
3-in-1 (Sweet) [SP]	6m	4m	Three varieties grafted onto one tree. Perfect for small yards.	5
Bing (Sweet, Black)	6m	4m	The most popular sweet cherry. Large, black fruit produced in volume. May take several years to produce fruit. Ripens mid July.	5
Hedelfingen (Sweet, Black)	6m	4m	Medium-large black cherry with good firmness. Most widely planted cherry in Ontario. Ripens in Late July. Works well in combination with 'Bing.'	5
Montmorency (Sour, Red)	4m	3m	Most popular sour cherry. Bright red; productive from a young age. Late July.	4
Skeena (Sweet, Red) [SP]	6m	4m	Large, sweet, dark red-black fruit; very firm. Late July.	4
Stella (Sweet, Black) [SP]	4m	3m	Large, sweet black fruit. Tree is a natural dwarf and is self-pollinating, making it ideal for small yards. Ripens late July.	5
Van (Sweet, Black)	6m	4m	Fruit is similar to 'Bing,' only smaller. Pollinizes almost every cherry. Early July.	5
Vandalay (Sweet, Red) [SP]	6m	4m	Red fruit is large, firm, sweet and crack-resistant. Ripens mid-July.	5
Viscount (Sweet, Red)	6m	4m	Cross between Bing and Hedelfingen. High quality, sweet red fruit. Mid July.	5

Fantasia	4m	3m	Large freestone fruit; red with yellow blush. Sweet, firm flesh. Mid September.	5
Harflame	4m	3m	Medium red fruit with a yellow blush. Semi-freestone. Mid August.	5
Redgold	4m	3m	Large red fruit with yellow blush. Freestone with good firmness. Early Sept.	5
PEACH			*All peaches are self-pollinating.	
Allstar	4m	3m	Medium-sized, bright red freestone with firm flesh. Stores well. Late August	6
Brighton	4m	3m	Clingstone fruit is medium-sized with a bright red blush. Early August.	5
Cresthaven			Yellow, juicy freestone, non-browning	
Early Redhaven	4m	3m	Smaller, more colourful, early version of Redhaven. Freestone. Early August.	5
Glowingstar	4m	3m	Med-large freestone fruit with attractive red blush. Good cropper. Mid-Sept.	5
Harrow Diamond	4m	3m	Medium fruit is bright yellow with a red blush. Very sweet. Hardy. Early Aug.	5
Harrow Fair	4m	3m	Brightly coloured, med-large freestone fruit is juicy and colourful. Late August.	5
Redhaven	4m	3m	Freestone; medium red fruit is great for eating and canning. Mid Aug.	6
Reliance	4m	4m	Hardy, late-blooming variety. Medium red fruit is soft and juicy. Mid August.	5

4-in-1 (Self-pollinating)	6m	5m	Four varieties grafted onto one tree. Ideal for yards with space for only one tree.	5
5-in-1 (Self-pollinating)	6m	5m	Five varieties grafted onto one tree. Ideal for yards with space for only one tree.	5
4-in-1 Asian (Self-pollinating)	6m	5m	Four varieties grafted onto one tree. Ideal for yards with space for only one tree.	5
Anjou	6m	5m	Light green, mild flavoured, firm flesh. Stores very well. Early October.	5
Bartlett	6m	5m	Large, golden yellow fruit is juicy and flavourful. Excellent pollinizer. Very productive, even from a young age. Mid-September.	4
Bosc	6m	5m	Green-brown fruit with flavourful flesh. Long storage life. Early October.	5
Clapp	6m	5m	Cold hardy variety with large yellow fruit. Very productive. Early September.	4
Flemish Beauty	6m	5m	The hardiest variety. Medium green fruit with red blush. Late Sept.	3b
Harrow Gold	6m	5m	Very good dessert pear with juicy, sweet flesh and yellow skin. Late August.	5
EUROPEAN PLUM			*European plums are somewhat self-fruitful, but benefit from cross-pollination with another European plum. European plums cannot pollinate Japanese plums and vice-versa. [SP] denotes fully self-pollinating.	
Damson [SP]	6m	5m	Small, semi-freestone blue-purple fruit. Best used for preserves. Mid-Sept.	5
Green Gage[SP]	6m	5m	Small-medium oval shaped fruit; green with amber flesh. A very tasty variety that has been popular since the 1700's. Mid September.	4
Italian Prune	6m	5m	Medium, oblong, blue fruit; popular for fresh eating and preserves. Late Sept.	4
Mount Royal [SP]	6m	5m	Medium sized; round; blue skin with yellow flesh. A true Canadian plum, discovered near Montreal and named after the city. Late August.	4
Stanley [SP]	6m	5m	Reliable purple-blue, oval-shaped freestone plum. Good pollinizer. Mid-Sept.	5
Toka	6m	5m	Large purple-skinned fruit with yellow flesh. Hardest plum. Late August.	4
JAPANESE PLUM			*Japanese plums need cross-pollination from another variety of Japanese plum. Japanese plums cannot pollinate European plums and vice-versa.	
Burbank	6m	5m	Round, dark red, medium sized clingstone fruit. Excellent quality. Late August	5
Early Golden	6m	5m	Very productive variety; medium, yellow freestone plums. Ripens end of July.	5
Satsuma	6m	5m	Large, juicy red fruit with unique flavour and a small pit. Ripens mid August.	5
Shiro	6m	5m	Choice variety with large, yellow clingstone fruit. Best pollinizer. Mid August.	5
